Starter: How many of these catchy phrases do you know that start with "Keep calm and...."? Today we are going to learn how to apply the "Keep calm and carry on" to our spiritual life.

Learning objectives: To understand that God is the source of our strength and courage. Faith keep us strong and make us carry on.

Core Activities and Learning

Introduction: Do you remember the story of David and Goliath?

Say that Three thousand years ago, in the Valley of Elah, a massive man named Goliath of Gath stepped out of the Philistine ranks to defy and taunt the army of Israel and its God. For forty days, he harangued the Israelite warriors, heaping shame on them, since none dared to accept his fight-to-the-death, winner-takes-all challenge. Every morning when he stepped forward, the men of God shrank back. Then a teenage Hebrew shepherd boy named David showed up in the camp with some bread and cheese for his soldier big brothers and heard the giant pour out his scorn on the impotent host of his Lord. David was indignant. So, he took his shepherd's sling, grabbed a few stones, knocked Goliath on the forehead, and killed him. David saw God as bigger and stronger than the fearful Philistine. So, he went out to fight knowing that God would give him victory over Goliath — and when he did, the victory would demonstrate God's power and faithfulness, not David's courage (1 Samuel 17:46–47). Explain that courage is always produced by faith in God, because He is the source of courage. All we need to do is keep our eyes fixed on Him and continue praying on Him. The Bible give us many examples to encourage us:

- Deuteronomy 31:6 Be strong and of good courage, do not fear nor be afraid of them; for the LORD your God, He is the One who goes with you. He will not leave you nor forsake you.
- Psalm 27:1 The LORD is my light and my salvation; Whom shall I fear? The LORD is the strength of my life; Of whom shall I be afraid?
- Psalm 56:3-4 When I am afraid, I will trust in you. In God, whose word I praise, in God I trust; I will not be afraid.
 What can mortal man do to me?
- Isaiah 41:10 So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand.
