Prayer: Trisagion Prayers

Starter: Word Synonym Game ... in turn the students call out words similar or connected to "holy."

Learning objectives: - To understand Isaiah's experience in the Temple and how it informed his mission as a prophet.

- To learn more about our own Eucharistic experience, our personal prayers and our mission.

Core Activities and Learning

- Prophet Isaiah lived 700 years before the Birth of Christ. He prophesied in a situation of great national danger when Judah was besieged by Assyrian invaders. His messianic prophecies look forward beyond these events to the coming of Christ in a vivid and detailed manner so that he is often quoted by New Testament writers.
- Isaiah is considered to be one of the four "major" prophets; so called because their books are much longer than the Minor Prophets (they are not "more important" than the minor prophets). The Major Prophets are: Isaiah, Jeremiah, Daniel and Ezekiel.

ACTIVITIES (Discovery and Discussion)

- Read Isaiah in the Temple (Isaiah 6) > Note the original context. Isaiah is in the Temple in Jerusalem. He has a vision of the Lord in all His holiness and from this encounter, he receives his prophetic mission.
- This passage is a good example to follow when we pray.
- First, we experience God's holiness in worship. (Find the corresponding text in Isaiah 6).
- Next, we fall down before God and realise our own unworthiness. (Find the corresponding text in Isaiah 6).
- Next, we experience the cleansing fire of God so that we can be His servants.
 (Find the corresponding text in Isaiah 6).
- Next, we listen to what God would have us do. (Find the corresponding text in Isaiah 6).

In the New Testament and in our lives ...

- Jesus always offers to remove our sins; just as He took the dark coal of our sins in his death and burned them away in his resurrection to share in His Light.
- After the Resurrection, Holy Communion presents His one sacrifice afresh and, therefore, removes our sins and
 makes us clean to serve Him.
- After being freed from our sins, we can then hear God's voice in a clearer way and see Him with more clarity, being enabled by His grace to fulfil His commandments.

Resources: Distribute a copy of Isaiah 6.

Review: We have a chance every Liturgy to get cleansed of our sins by receiving Christ's Body and Blood and then receive our mission call to serve God.

Follow Up: Take time each week before the Liturgy to prepare yourself by fasting, confession and prayer.
