Prayer: Trisagion Prayers

Starter: Ask the students to share from memory times when Christ showed goodness and kindness.

**Learning objectives:** To explore goodness and kindness as fundamental aspects of holiness created by God in hearts that have come to know and cherish His own kindness and goodness in Christ.

## **Core Activities and Learning**

This lesson essentially is a Bible Study on the following text. The leader should help the students explore the following questions:

- 1. What changes people in this text from being hateful to being kind? How did this happen in the life of St. Paul, the author of this Letter to Titus.
- 2. What in this text is the connection with baptism by water and the Holy Spirit.
- 3. "Justified by his grace" means that we are put into a right relationship with God through the grace of God's own goodness and loving kindness. How is this reflected in the parable of the Pharisee and the Publican (tax collector).
- 4. How can we nurture kindness and goodness in our own lives?
- **3** Remind them to be subject to rulers and authorities, to obey, to be ready for every good work, <sup>2</sup>to speak evil of no one, to be peaceable, gentle, showing all humility to all men. <sup>3</sup> For we ourselves were also once foolish, disobedient, deceived, serving various lusts and pleasures, living in malice and envy, hateful and hating one another. <sup>4</sup> But when the kindness and the love of God our Saviour toward man appeared, <sup>5</sup> not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to His mercy He saved us, through the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Spirit, <sup>6</sup> whom He poured out on us abundantly through Jesus Christ our Saviour, <sup>7</sup> that having been justified by His grace we should become heirs according to the hope of eternal life.

<sup>8</sup>This is a faithful saying, and these things I want you to affirm constantly, that those who have believed in God should be careful to maintain good works. These things are good and profitable to men. (Titus 3:1-8)
