Learning objectives: To learn what we celebrate on the Third and Fourth Sunday of Great Lent with application to life.

Core Activities and Learning

Say that on the Third Sunday of Great and Holy Lent, the Orthodox Church commemorates the Precious and Life-Giving Cross of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Refer to the following points:

- Services include a special veneration of the Cross, which prepares the faithful for the commemoration of the Crucifixion during Holy Week.
- the Cross stands in the midst of the church in the middle of the Lenten season to remind Christians of Christ's redemption and to keep before them the goal of their efforts, which is spiritual growth through fasting, praying and offering to people in need.

On the Fourth Sunday of Lent we celebrate St. John Climacus (Ladder), who wrote The Ladder of Divine Ascent.

Say here a few words for the Saint: St. John was born around the year 570. When he was sixteen, he went to the Monastery of St. Katherine at Mount Sinai. Four years later, St John was tonsured as a monk. He later spent forty solitary years in the desert. Toward the end of his life, the Lord granted him the gifts of prophecy and wonder-working.

Explain that St John of Climacus is the writer of "The Ladder of Divine Ascent" for monks who wished to attain spiritual perfection. These steps apply to everyone though, not only to monks. St John of Climacus talks about "a ladder fixed on the earth" (Gen. 28:12), leading people to the gates of Heaven. The thirty steps of spiritual perfection correspond to the thirty years of the Lord's age. The Ladder begins with the renunciation (rejection) of the world, proceeds gradually from strength to strength on the path of perfection, and ends with God, Who is love.

Activities

(Lent 3): Discuss with the children how Christ has saved us on the cross through both forgiveness and his victory over sin, evil, suffering and death (in the resurrection).

(Lent 4): Two column lists on the whiteboard; one column headed temptations, the other, virtues. Children contribute ideas for each column.
